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On AIR Tour Europe Leg 1 Recap

Monday, March 31st - Madrid, Spain

We kicked off the first leg of the <u>On AIR Tour Europe</u> in Madrid, Spain on Monday the 31st of March. The crew consisted of myself, <u>Mike Chambers, Danny Dura, Kevin Hoyt, Ryan Stewart, Enrique Duvos, Serge</u> <u>Jespers, Ted Patrick, Andre Charland</u>, and Chris Britchford. Most everyone arrived a day or two early to check out the sites but I arrived at around midnight on Sunday night due to the well-publicized troubles at Heathrow's new Terminal 5. But I did get to spend most of Sunday in the first class British Airways lounge so don't feel too bad for me.

We arrived at the venue around 8:30 and began setting up for the day. After dealing with some issues with the video game setups and not having the right power adapters, we settled into the "evangelist corner" which is where most of us put finishing touches on our slides and demos during the day. The crowd starting flowing in around 9:00 am and began munching on the breakfast goodies we had laid out for them.

Enrique gave the keynote in Spanish but he definitely kept the attention of the crowd. The public alpha of <u>AIR on Linux</u> had just went live this morning and he showed a really cool demo that involved dragging AIR applications between Linux and Mac using <u>VMWare</u>. Throughout the day I poked my head in to watch Danny, Kevin, and Mike laying the foundation of AIR out for the crowd. Despite some minor language barriers, the crowd seemed really into the presentations and consistently had great questions for us. There were many people from Portugal there and I met a few <u>gotoAndLearn()</u> fans which was nice. They re-iterated their desire for Adobe to come to their country for a future event.

My presentation was the last of the day. It is 1/3 design, 1/3 development, and 1/3 comedy. I wasn't sure whether my jokes would go over well because of the language barrier but I have once again proved that all cultures find humor in the sound of farts and burps. At the end of my session I demonstrated how you could decompile AIR applications with tools like <u>Sothink</u>. We attended a little blogger dinner after the event and although there were only a couple of bloggers there, the food was outstanding. After dinner I went back to the hotel to relax while Chris, Ryan, and Andre went up the Eiffel Tower to do the tourist thing. As is normally the case when Ryan and Andre are involved, it eventually ended up in a bar with interesting stories to be told the following day.

Thursday, April 3rd – Train to Amsterdam

This day consisted of a leisurely train journey to Europe's answer to Las Vegas, Amsterdam. We finally had power for this journey and most of us worked on building new demos and adjusting our slide decks. Belgium Flex hero, <u>Peter Elst</u>, also joined us in Amsterdam to add some local talent to the roster. The hotel was mediocre at best and had a lot of local charm, aka old and small. Saturday and Sunday, April 5th and 6th – Amsterdam, Netherlands

It turned out that what people call pancakes in Amsterdam are actually crepes to us Americans. I had pancakes with cherries, chocolate, and vanilla ice cream. Very tasty!

On Sunday we boarded another train headed for Brussels. This was only a 2 hour or so journey and was a very nice train with power and meal service. After arrival in Brussels we walked to the hotel, which was the nicest of the trip. I finally managed to get a workout in which felt great.

Monday, April 7th – Brussels, Belgium

We took cabs to the venue, which was a very cool setup. They had eight projectors on the walls, which contained the three game consoles, various tour graphics, and even a Flickr tour photo slideshow. The food was really good at this event and included Belgium waffles, macaroons, and other unhealthy fare.

<u>Oliver Goldman</u>, an engineer on the AIR team, joined the crew to fill the position of the now departed Chris Britchford. <u>Nicolas Lierman</u> also joined the tour and gave a great presentation on Google Analytics application. He even showed some screenshots of the next version of the application, which looked very slick.

Enrique headed back to Spain so we had UK-based evangelist <u>Andrew Shorten</u> come aboard the tour. Andrew gave a nice session on Livecycle DS and discussed AIR from more of a data-centric viewpoint. This was a nice offset to some of the more visual stuff that was shown.

Again I was pleasantly surprised by how well the crowd reacted to my session. Slowly as the tour rolled on, my session became more of a humorous, end-of-the-day type of thing with of course a little AIR knowledge thrown in. The Ryan Stewart drag and drop application was a classic that was loved in all the cities.

Tuesday, April 8th – Train to London

This was a mellow day, which consisted of a leisurely train trip to London. We arrived in London around mid-afternoon and it was nice to be in an English-speaking country again. I took a much-needed nap after we arrived and then headed out to get Starbucks, which provided a much-needed taste of home.

I had a great time meeting various UK-based Flashers like <u>Aral Balkan</u> and <u>Seb Lee-Delisle</u>. I was also really happy to meet a lot of gotoAndLearn() fans at the event as well. I have been corresponding with <u>Renaldo</u> <u>Lawrence</u> for a couple of years and it was great finally meeting in person. <u>Lawrence Job</u> and <u>Simon Shand</u> are two guys who have been very active in the <u>GTAL forums</u> since its inception so it was great meeting them as well. If only I had gotten into Flash when I was their age. There were ton of other cool people who I

chatted with in London as well.

As for sessions, we had a couple of local UK speakers talking about the apps that they are working on. Howard Baines presented his application called <u>AlertThingy</u>, which is a social network aggregator that gives you alerts about all of your feeds. This is a very well designed application that I think will be really popular. Some people from the BBC were there demoing something they built, but unfortunately I missed it.

Thursday, April 9th - Fly home

Home, sweet home! I really enjoyed the two weeks on the tour but I was definitely ready for some California sunshine. In about 6 weeks we will be heading back to Europe for leg 2 which promises to be another wacky adventure.
